- Side comment - it is not helpful for you to have the new directors meeting at the same time as system director meetings.
- I plan to attend.
- I am not going this year because ARL meets at the same time.
- I find it odd that a facility on the campus of a state university does not honor the hotel rate for state employees.
- Venue in Austin doesn't affect my attending.
- Having our system directors come together in conjunction with this meeting is important. I would not want to see that change.
- We regularly attend and greatly enjoy the location of Austin's AT&T Conference Center
- Nothing TCAL can do. Schedules just haven't made it possible for me to go.
- Attending this year, it was not in the budget my first year.
- My responses are a bit unfair, since my institution is located just outside of Austin. The meeting venue couldn't be more conveniently located for me.
- More covenant location
- Question 36 [more or less likely to attend if we move the location] confused me. I don't really care if it's moved around - I've come every year since before TCAL was even formed (when TICUL was a separate organization), and I intend on continuing to attend as long as the meetings keep happening. I'm a big TCAL supporter and find it's one of the most valuable meetings I attend each year. So moving it to another location probably won't make me any more likely, or less likely, to attend. I benefit from living about 50 minutes from Austin and realize that folks in far east or west Texas or the Valley have a long haul to get here, so I'd be willing to travel to their areas sometimes!
