ACTIVITY 1

Group Discussion

Reflect

Establish a conversation with your young reader(s) about how Areli feels when she is new to living in New York City and new to her school. Some questions to ask readers might include:

- What happens when Areli arrives at her new school?
- What do other children say and do?
- What could children do differently to help Areli feel welcomed and accepted?
- What would you have done to help Areli feel included?

Explain to children that when someone is new to a school, community, or group it is important to be welcoming to them. You can define welcoming as being treated in a friendly way, so that you feel included, valued, and accepted. You can share that most people have been "new" at some point in their lives. Every year there are new students in Kindergarten, sometimes you may have new neighbors in your community, and even new teachers at a school.

Have children work in small groups to come up with different scenarios a new student may encounter at their school or in their classroom. Help children identify obstacles the student and family might face and have children brainstorm positive strategies to assist the student. Children can be creative and deliver a finished product as a graphic novel, a play, a video, poem, or any other medium.

ACTIVITY 2

In the "Author's Note" at the beginning of the book, Areli Morales writes, "I was a child of two worlds — a Mexican citizen by birth but raised as an American." Display this statement to children and have them provide their perspective on what it means to live in "two worlds."

Explain to children that living in two worlds can mean different things to individuals. It can be, like in the case of Areli, she balances two identities, two cultures, and two languages. Other examples could include balancing where someone may live and where someone may go to school and work and how people change how they behave.

Have children find examples of those two worlds in Areli's story or in the illustrations used throughout the book. Children can state their findings through pictures, written response with text evidence, or a Venn diagram. Have them then share if any of them live between two worlds and how does that make them feel or relate to Areli.





ACTIVITY 2


Playing Together! Games Played by Children in Latin America

ACTIVITY 1

Self-Regulation Exercises

Discuss with readers how Dog Man got over-excited and was fired from his job. Have the readers ever experienced a time when they felt over-excited and perhaps got in trouble for their actions or behavior?

Brainstorm exercises and strategies that children can practice/implement when they start to feel over-excited. Some examples include: finger breathing, rainbow breathes, or mindful exercises.

ACTIVITY 2

Create Your Own Graphic Novel

Books in the graphic novel format have become very popular with young readers. Invite your child or children to create their own graphic novel using some of their favorite characters from Dog Man or they can create their own story. ACTIVITY 1

Airplane STEM Challenge

A fun way to extend the reading of this narrative nonfiction book is by having young readers learn about aerodynamics, the forces of flight, and the fun of paper airplanes! Hopefully, the children will see how Aída was also inspired to take flight and can work collaboratively to improve their designs and distance traveled.

For this activity, the children can decide on at least three airplane designs and sketch out their designs prior to folding. There are countless videos available online for participants to refer to. Children can construct a table which features the design of the plane, how many seconds it was flying, total distance covered, and calculate averages after a few trials.

Participants can compare their designs with each other and discuss what made their planes fly farther and stay aloft longer.


ACTIVITY 2

Researching My Future Profession

For this activity, participants will research the qualifications they would need to possess to fulfill the requirements of a future profession they would like to work in. Readers can recount how Aída was inspired to become a pilot, but she needed to have courage and patience to prepare before taking flight.

This activity would be a great opportunity to highlight lesser known or more niche professions. Participants interested in art and science might have never heard of medical illustration or participants interested in engineering and math might have never heard of pharmaceutical engineering. Participants can research multiple sources to find facts and requirements for education. They can map out their path to their profession beginning from their current grade level to their highest degree or training.

Display these paths throughout the home, classroom, or library and encourage children to dress up as their future professional self to provide insight to their classmates.



ACTIVITY 1

Rainbow Words

The two boys learn colors from each other while painting in school. Create a rainbow outline using the colors red, orange, yellow, green, blue, purple. Have particpants think of different objects in nature, the classroom, or their daily lives that go into each category. They will illustrate the item and research the Spanish and English word for each object.

In the end, they will have a rainbow outline full of objects with their English and Spanish words. Example: the red band of the rainbow can include an apple (manzana), a cardinal (cardenal), and a lollipop (paleta).

ACTIVITY 2


That's Me

One person stands in front of the group and shares a fact about themselves, like their favorite color or favorite animal. Everyone who also shares that favorite thing stands up and yells, "That's me!"

Kids love this game because it's interactive. They get to share their favorite things, there's fun in not knowing what each child is going to say, and there's yelling.





ACTIVITY 1

Make a Paper Dove (younger readers)

Materials: Paper plate, cotton ball, white cardstock, black cardstock, wiggle eyes, glue.

Instructions: Trace two hands on the cardboard and cut the silhouette. Fold paper plates in half. Glue the cotton ball and paper hands to the plate. Make a peak with the black cardboard. Add wiggle eyes and peak to your dove.




Discuss: After visiting the site and watching the video, discuss to child/children about what you/they read and watched:

- What does migration mean?
- Where do North American monarchs start their trip?
- What is their final destination?
- Why do North American monarchs immigrate each year?

Ask the child/children to find more information based on their level of interest and capacity.

- Starting a butterfly garden

ACTIVITY 2

Teaching Children About Patience

"Patience is not simply the ability to wait - it's how we behave while we're waiting." —Joyce Meyer

Themes: Emotions and feelings Skills: developing or increasing patience Goal: To introduce help the child/children to develop/enhance this important skill Appropriateness: toddler age and up

Below there is a list of games that can help develop patience in children:

Spoon and egg: Each participant gets a spoon and an egg. The egg gets placed on the spoon, and the end of the spoon is placed in the mouth of the participant. The goal is to transport the egg in the spoon from point A to point B without dropping it. No hands are allowed and whoever uses them, gets disqualified.


This game can be very competitive for kids; therefore, take the opportunity to teach them about the importance of being patient and careful when carrying the egg so they can succeed at reaching point B without dropping the egg.

Reading-aloud time: From expanding oral vocabulary to teaching critical thinking, building community, and developing patience, reading aloud is an important activity that can easily be set at any time and location. All you need is to carry a book (or an electronic device for ebooks) at all times. Having a library card is a plus and will help to increase the variety of choices without sacrificing the home budget! This activity can turn a boring waiting time into a fun and bonding activity!

Here are some tips to make this activity a success:

- Select age-appropriate stories based on the child/children's interest and experiences
- Read with expression
- Take turns to read if the child/children knows how to read
- Encourage prediction
- Discuss the book after you finish reading it

Puzzles: Puzzles featuring favorite movie or TV show characters and animals can increase the child/children's attention and engagement in the activity. The goal is to have them complete the puzzle so choose it according to the age and interest of the child/children (less, bigger pieces and more sturdy materials for younger kids, for instance.) As children grow up, the level of difficulty can be increased.


Discuss predators and prey. Construct a simple food chain or a more complex food web based on the animal characters and plants found in the book.

When Pokko's friend gets eaten by the wolf, Pokko stands up to the predator to let him know that his behavior is not allowed. What would you do if someone was bullying your friend? If you were Pokko, would you have allowed the wolf to continue playing with you? Why or why not?



ACTIVITY 2

Taste Different Fruits

This story takes place in Cuba, you can taste the wonderful fruit the young character in Un pregon de frutas sings about. And since you cannot go to Cuba just to taste the fruit, you may be able to experience something similar.

Texas is rich in Mexican and Tex-Mex culture. Visit a local Fruteria or create a kid-friendly charcuterie board with different fruits purchased at your local grocery store to share with your child healthy snacks. If you have not visited a Fruteria before, it is usually a small store that primarily serves Mexican desserts, beverages, antojitos and other popular Mexican snack foods

ACTIVITY 1

Make a Paper Megaphone (younger readers)

Materials: Cardstock, glue, markers.

Instructions: Roll a sheet of card stock to create a cone shape. Glue the edges to make sure it stays in a cone shape. Ask readers to write down a cause they care about and decorate as desired.

ACTIVITY 2

Poster Boards (older readers)


Materials: Poster board and markers.

Ask your child or children to identify examples of unfairness in their communities. Have them pick one item and make a poster board about it as if they were going to attend a peaceful demonstration. Discuss appropriate use of words and phrases before starting the activity.

ACTIVITY 3

Large Group Discussion

- Option A: Ask readers to think about an issue or problem at their school or in their community. Brainstorm together about ways to solve it and ask them to find ways to make their voices heard.
- Option B: Ask readers to identify a minority or person of color who they believe is a leader. If it is a community member, ask them to interview them to find out how that person makes their voice heard or what they're passionate about. If it is a public or historical figure, ask them to find information about this person and find out what issues they advocate for.
- Option C: Ask students to identify something they are really good at. Ask them to think about ways to use their special talent to advocate for something that would benefit their communities.



ACTIVITY 1

Picture Poetry

Poetry is the form of writing in this story. Participants can brainstorm ideas of topics they are interested in and begin their own picture poetry in a journal. Children can expand on these writings with illustrations and if they feel comfortable, create a gallery walk so that others can view their works of art and writing.

ACTIVITY 2

Figurative Language

There are several examples of figurative language used throughout the story. Discuss and review some forms of figurative language with readers, such as similes, metaphors, personification and more. The children can work with partners or small groups to identify examples of figurative language in the book and then work on creating their own examples of figurative language and incorporating it into their own writing.

ACTIVITY 1

Go for a Walk

Go for a walk at dusk like the main character in the story. What do you see? What do you hear? What do you smell? What is the weather like? When you get back home, draw a picture of something you saw, and write three favorite things about your walk.

ACTIVITY 2

Research Nocturnal Animals

The main character sees some nocturnal animals during the walk. Which nocturnal animals live in your area? What do they eat? Where do they sleep? Have you ever seen any or heard them at night? Research the nocturnal animals in your community by reading books about them, searching your library's databases, or reading about common Texas wildlife through Texas Parks and Wildlife's Fact Sheets found here:

ACTIVITY 3

Bedtime Rituals

The main character in the story goes for a walk with the family dog and then snuggles up to read a book. What are your bedtime rituals? What are healthy things that you can do at bedtime to relax your mind and body and get ready to sleep?
