Discussion Questions:

- Are there pinecones around where you live? I wonder where you might find them?
- The girl in the book collected a lot of pinecones what do you like to collect?

Book Activities

Activity #1: Preserve Pinecones

Go for a nature walk in your neighborhood, or at your local park or library. Use these directions on the back flap of the book to preserve your pinecones.

"How to prepare pinecones for in-home use

With a grown-up's help

- Soak pinecones in a bucket of diluted vinegar until they close up.
- Dry pinecones in the sun or in an oven set at 170* (77*C) until the pinecones reopen.

These steps will remove sap, dirt, and hidden critters."

Some ideas: paint your pinecone(s), use hot glue to attach googly eyes or pompoms, or tie on a ribbon scarf.










Adela's Mariachi Band/Los mariachis de Adela

Discussion Questions:

Take some time to learn about the different instruments that create the rich sounds, such as the guitar, violin, trumpet, vihuela, and guitarrón. Discuss how each instrument contributes to the overall harmony.



Draw a map of your own imaginary world! What's on your map? What kind of adventures would you go on there?




Bear's Lost Glasses

Place pictures of different animals around your space. Use homemade binoculars to search for the animals. <u>Toilet Paper Binoculars</u>




Duck Goes Meow

Go and Get with Rex



I'm Sorry You Got Mad



Discussion Questions:

- Why do you think it's important to say 'I'm sorry' when we've hurt someone's feelings, even if we didn't mean to?
- How does saying sorry help us rebuild friendships?

Book Activities

Activity #1: Letter Writing

Write or draw an apology or Thank You letter to someone.

Activity #2 Build a Castle Together

Gather various materials like cardboard boxes, paper towel rolls, building blocks, or even LEGO bricks, and team up with a friend, family member, or classmate to create a one-of-a-kind castle. Use your creativity to design towers, walls, and a drawbridge. Decorate your castle with flags, stickers, or markers to make it unique. Work together to decide who might live there—a brave knight, a magical princess, or even a dragon! This hands-on activity is a fun way to build something amazing while learning the power of teamwork and imagination.




Into the Goblin Market

Rhyming couplets, familiar fairy-tale motifs, and woodblock style illustrations in black, white, and red lend rhythm and spookiness to this tale full of courage, cleverness, and adventure.

Book Activities


Lefty: A Story That is Not All Right

About the Author

Mo Willems is an author, illustrator, animator, and playwright. Willems is best known for his #1 New York Times bestselling picture books, which have been awarded three Caldecott Honors (Don't Let the Pigeon Drive the Bus!; Knuffle Bunny: A Cautionary Tale; Knuffle Bunny Too: A Case of Mistaken Identity), and his celebrated Elephant and Piggie early reader series, which has been awarded two Theodor Geisel Medals and five Geisel Honors.

Discussion Questions:

- Are you left-handed or right-handed? What about your family, friends, or classmates?
- In the past, people would pretend to be right-handed even though they were left-handed! Have you ever pretended to like something you didn't? How did that make you feel?

Book Activities

Activity #1: Use your non-dominant hand

Practice using your non-dominant hand for everyday activities! Are you right-handed? Use your left hand to write your name, brush your teeth, or use a spoon. Find more activities for left-and right-hands from the publisher!

Activity #2: Hand-Puppets

Use felt, googly eyes, and other craft supplies to make a face for your hand-puppet, then put on a show with a friend, classmate, or family member!









Millie Fleur's Poison Garden






Pickle Words: Crunchy, Punchy, Pickles, & Poetry

Discussion Questions:

- Think about a time you tried a new food. What was it? Did you like it? Why or why not?


Book Activities

Spider in the Well



Readers will delight in his



process of untangling truth from lie, and using the knowledge gained to his advantage.

She was awarded the Warby Parker Visionary Scholarship Award by the Society of Illustrators in 2020, and the Bronze Jon Klassen award in her graduating years' showcase at Sheridan College. Discussion Questions:

- Are you always honest? Is it ever okay to tell a lie?
- If you could make a wish, knowing that it would definitely come true, what would you wish for and why?

Book Activities

Activity #1: Make a Wish!

Have a conversation about the ways that you know that people make wishes (wishing on a shooting star, blowing out candles on a cake, etc.). The Man Who Didn't Like Animals



Discussion Questions:

- Is there an item in your family that has been passed down from other generations? What is it and why is it important to your family?
- Have you ever broken something that is special to someone else? How did you fix it?

Use the illustrations in the book as inspiration to paint a picture with <u>sensory spice paint</u>.




There Are No Ants in This Book


