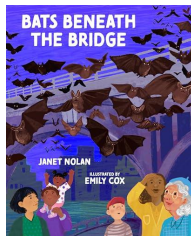

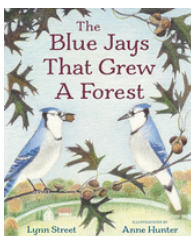
GRADES K-2

Bats Beneath the Bridge by Janet Nolan, illustrated by Emily Cox (Albert Whitman & Company, 2024)



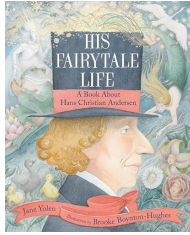
The bats under the Congress Avenue Bridge are famous in Texas and beyond. How did the largest bat colony in North America wind up in Austin? Learn to appreciate these wonderful and misunderstood animals.

****The Blue Jays That Grew a Forest*** by Lynn Street, illustrated by Anne Hunter (Margaret Quinlin Books, an imprint of Peachtree Publishing Company Inc., 2025)



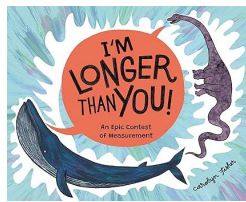

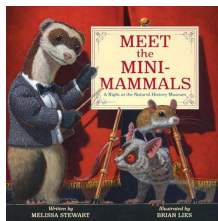

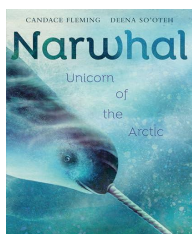
into a playful showdown of size.

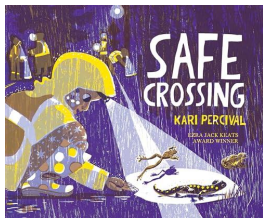
Lyrical text and impressive illustrations guide readers along the migration journey of a Narwhal pod as they journey through Arctic waters, search for food, and protect their young.

****Safe Crossing*** by Kari Percival (Chronicle Books, 2025)



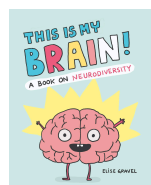

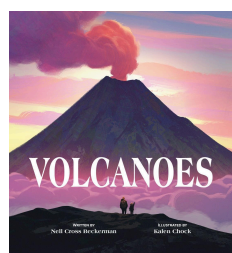

This is my Brain! A Book on Neurodiversity by Elise Gravel (Chronicle Books, 2024)



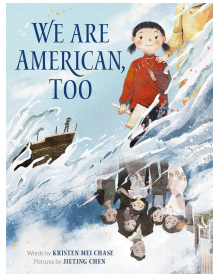
Brains are wonderful and do a lot for you. Each brain is the same but also different and that keeps the world interesting.

Volcanoes by Nell Cross Beckerman, illustrated by Kalen Chock (Orchard Books, an imprint of Scholastic Inc., 2024)



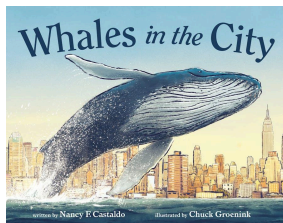

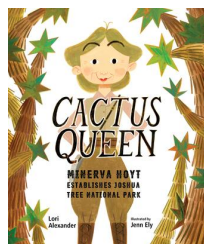

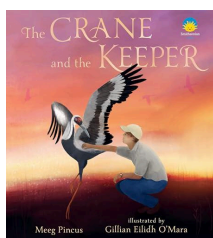

Cactus Queen: Minerva Hoyt Establishes Joshua Tree National Park by Lori Alexander, illustrated by Jenn Ely (Calkins Creek, an imprint of Astra Books for Young Readers, 2024)



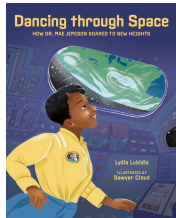
Minerva Hoyt recognized the beauty of the Mojave Desert and created a traveling landscape exhibit to raise awareness about the importance of its preservation. After an initial denial, she rallied support for reconsideration, ultimately leading to the establishment of Joshua Tree National Park and earning her the nickname "Cactus Queen."

The Crane and the Keeper by Meeg Pincus, illustrated by Gillian Eilidh O'Mara (Candlewick Entertainment, an imprint of Candlewick Press, 2025)



Walnut the White-Naped Crane didn't think she was a crane but a human! Chris Crowe, her crane keeper, worked hard to help Walnut at the Conservation Biology Institute. With time and patience a bond grew between the crane and her keeper.

Dancing Through Space: Dr. Mae Jemison Soars to New Heights by Lydia Lukidis, illustrated by Sawyer Cloud (Albert Whitman & Co., 2024)



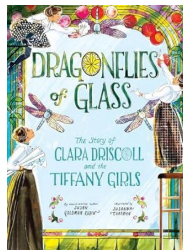

The Danger Files: Real-Life Disasters by Anna Crowley Redding (Candlewick Press, 2025)



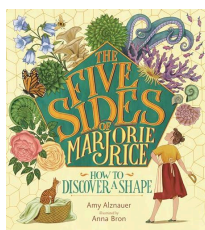
Readers get to become detectives or investigative reporters as they read about real disasters that have occurred. The stories are given, but with Danger Clue(s)! and Fact Files mixed into the story. The who, what, where, when, and how the disasters are given in a fun way to the reader. The disasters are seen as not being just stories but being real as the events are told through the eyewitness accounts of children their ages. The narrow escapes, mysteries, tales of survival, and disasters make finding out what really happened a truly exciting read.

****Dragonflies of Glass: The Story of Clara Driscoll and the Tiffany Girls*** by Susan Goldman Ruben, illustrated by Susanna Chapman (Abrams Books for Young Readers, an imprint of ABRAMS, 2025)



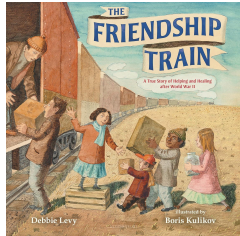
In a time when most women stayed at home with their families, Clara Driscoll and other talented women worked for the famous Tiffany Glass Company designing and creating works of masterful art. Their lamps and other glass designs were world renown, but the women who created them were often overshadowed by their male counterparts and didn't receive proper recognition until now.

The Five Sides of Marjorie Rice: How to Discover a Shape by Amy Alznauer, illustrated by Anna Bron (Candlewick Press, 2025)



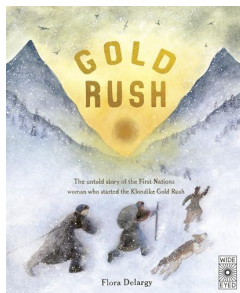
Creativity and support of it abound in THE FIVE SIDES OF MARJORIE RICE. Phenomenally intricate illustrations by Anna Byron, including her own tessellating patterns, bring life to Amy Alznauer's text about mathematics and the puzzles surrounding tessellating tiles. Marjorie Rice was a true amateur mathematician who decided that she would create a new "versatile" even though it had been decades since any were discovered. Readers learn about the Golden Ratio, M.C. Escher, that math can be fun, and more while exploring nature with Marjorie.

The Friendship Train: A True Story of Helping and Healing After World War II by Debbie Levy, illustrated by Boris Kulikov (Bloomsbury Children's Books, an imprint of Bloomsbury Publishing Inc., 2025)



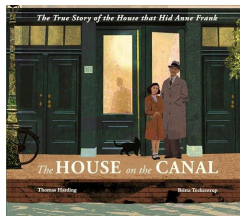
The Friendship Train came about as a way to help fill hungry bellies Italy and France after World War II. From the newspaper article written by Drew Pearson in not one paper, but newspapers all over the U.S. the idea of a way for children and adults too, to collect food to send to these far away places. A train moved across the country adding boxcars full of dried food, and canned milk that people could not get in the war torn countries and winter was coming. At the end of the line 500 Boxcars of food were collected and it took 4 very large ships to transport it all to foreign ports.

The House on the Canal: The Story of the House that Hid Anne Frank by Thomas Harding, illustrated by Britta Teckentrup (Candlewick Studio, an imprint of Candlewick Press, 2023)



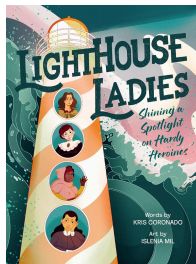

Small corner insets give dates for each new family, transition, or business. An ideal text-set addition for World War II or Anne Frank study.

Hurricane by Jason Chin (Neal Porter Books, an imprint of Holiday House Publishing, Inc., 2025)



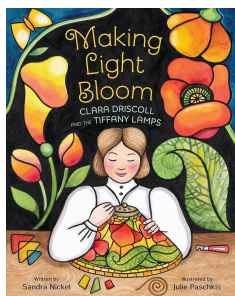

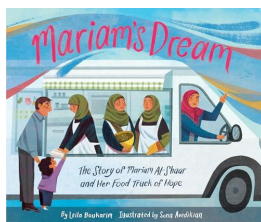
Meet four women whose courage, guts, and hard work saved lives and proved women could be lighthouse keepers. Learn about their daily lives, struggles and heroic acts.

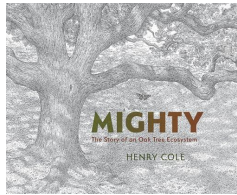
This tells the story of the iconic Tiffany Lamp creator, Clara Bloom highlighting her love for nature and her eye for engineering and craftsmanship.

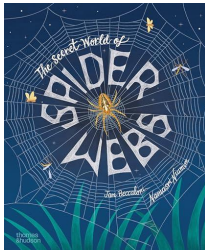

Mighty: The Story of an Oak Tree Ecosystem by Henry Cole, (Peachtree Publishing Company Inc., 2025)



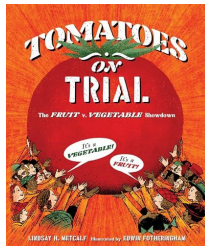

****The Secret World of Spiderwebs*** by Jan Beccaloni, illustrated by Namasri Niumim (Thames & Hudson, 2025)



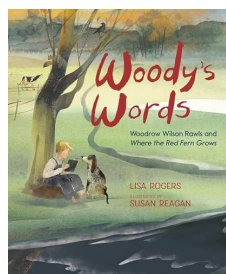

Tomatoes. Team fruit or Team vegetable? Follow the arguments as presented to the Supreme Court in 1893. Then you decide.

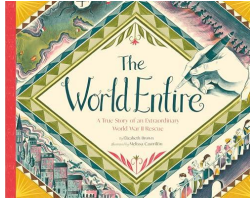

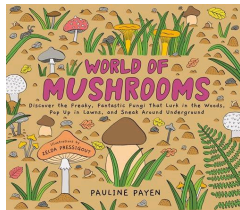
need for him to write.

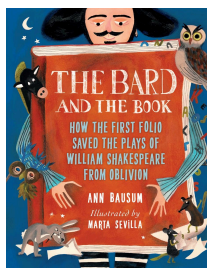

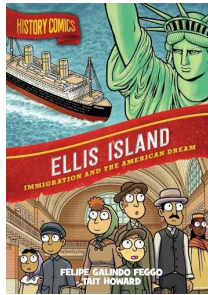

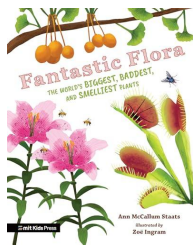
The author begins this entertaining read with a short introduction to Shakespeare's plays, followed by the fascinating process that was used to compile a catalog of his works into a printed folio. Without these folios, much of Shakespeare's works may have been lost forever. The folio's that still exist today also reveal insights about early printing methods and the importance of original source material.

Ellis Island: Immigration and the American Dream by Felipe Galindo Feggo, illustrated by Tait Howard (First Second, an imprint of Roaring Brook Press, 2025)



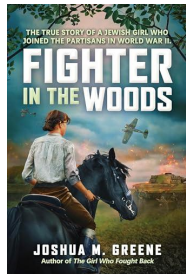
Learn the full history of Ellis Island as it evolved from a small piece of land to the historically iconic site that is critical to our nation's immigrants, regardless of their point of entry. The engaging graphic novel format relates facts from each stage of the island's history through to our present day. 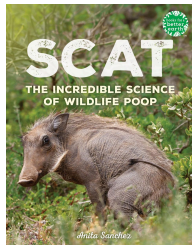

***SCAT: The Incredible Science of Wildlife Poop* by Anita Sanchez (Holiday House, 2025)**



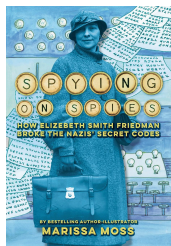

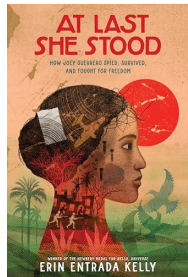
****Wish I Was a Baller*** By Amar Shah, illustrated by Rashad Doucet (Graphix, an imprint of Scholastic, 2025)

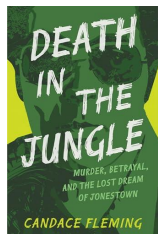

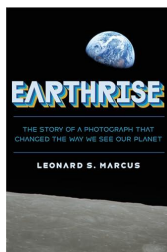
From a young orphaned girl who relates to Joan of Arc to surviving WWII in the Philippines even with Hansen's Disease she believes she can do anything such as spy, be a Guerrilla fighter, and deliver all important minefield maps (without being caught by the enemy). She comes to the United States after WWII and is healed when she comes to Louisiana then continues her life as a survivor of a dread disease, a teacher, and a peacemaker. The many sidebars help set the stage of time and place along with what is happening in her world, the Philippines, and why. This makes the story of Joey Guerrero even more compelling to read.

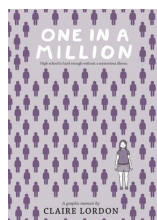

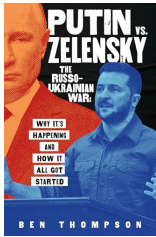

One in a Million by Clair Lordon (Candlewick Press, 2023)



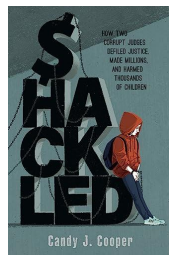

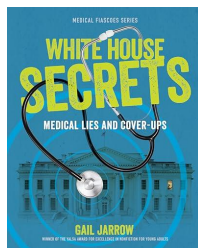
